Eleven cars set out very early on a Wednesday morning to ensure we all arrived at the SS Badger ferry dock in time for a 2:00 PM sailing. Everyone's car was in tip-top shape and we made excellent time up the Wisconsin countryside. The Badger personnel could not have been more

accommodating, letting our drivers back their own car into the loading deck. We felt we had an easier time than those loading their semis and even oversized tank cargos! The sail went very smoothly - a sunny but cool day and, most importantly, a flat surface.



After arriving in Luddington and getting to drive our cars from the boat, we went directly to our first night's location, Summer's Inn. What a delightful find! This older motel has been completely renovated with lovely rooms and a huge covered meeting area next to a pond complete with landscaping. It was the perfect meeting area after our dinner at P.M. Steamers. Which, by the way, was the first of many excellent dinners during the trip. In the morning our hosts provided a cooked to order breakfast omelet. This felt much more like a bed and breakfast, and we all wished we had been able to spend more time there.



It had rained during the night, and skies were overcast as we set out on Day 2 of our adventure. We headed north through Manistee and along the Lake Michigan coast stopping at Little River Casino for a short break and group picture. (No we didn't stay to gamble.)



Then to Empire and the Sleeping Bear Dunes Visitor Center where we learned a little bit about the sand dunes. Just south of Leland we turned east and crossed the peninsula to Suttons Bay. Our goal was Black Star Farms Winery for lunch and wine tasting. Lunch was great, and those who participated in the wine tasting thought their wines very good. By now the skies looked more threatening and everyones' smart phones were giving varying degrees of a bad storm on the way. Most continued on to Traverse Bay where an inviting ice cream shop awaited, while a couple elected to stay at the winery under the shelter of a bluff until the storm passed. Luckily, the storm was not nearly as bad as forecasted, and the groups met up after passing through Traverse Bay.
















Our second night was at the Apple Tree Inn in Petoskey - a great hotel near downtown, also with an area in their "breakfast room" to gather. Dinner was in the Noggin Room in the Perry Hotel, where we were able to have a private room. Their fish fry seemed to be a favorite! A few of us Packer fans gathered later to watch the game. Our enthusiasm didn't seem to help them.







There was a storm during the night that some heard and others didn't. We found a lot of small branches in the parking lot, but no damage to any of our cars. A local told us how to get down to a road along the bay in Harbor Springs that had manicured mansions on one side and private docks on the other. All the docks and any boats in the water had been damaged by the storm. And this went on for several blocks. We found out later that there had been a 3 foot surge during the night that lifted the docks right out of their positions and pushed everything up on the beach and rocky wall. When we left there, we drove through the Tunnel of Trees, a famous drive known for how the trees meet overhead - a beautiful area. Here, too, we found wind damage, and by the time we drove through all but a couple of the broken branches on the road had been cut up and moved aside. Because of the storm and threat of more rain, we had delayed leaving the Inn. As it happened, that gave everyone time to get started on the cleanup so we didn't need to change our route. At the end of the Tunnel of Trees we stopped at the Good Hart General Store - an authentic general 1934 store with a deli, bakery, and even a U.S. Post Office. The owner was so friendly and took great interest in our LBCs. Even the outhouse didn't dampen our good spirits!

Tech Tip...from the Little British Car Co via British Marque Car Club News

From Ron Neumunz: Golf tees make great hose plugs. Any time you work on any of the rubber fuel lines about the pump or carbs, there is always the problem of how to clamp off the line to avoid excess fuel spilling. I don't always have a pair of grip pliers on hand, and sometimes they don't work all that well, or apply too much force to a tired line.

A way to get around that is to use golf tees. They fit nicely into the 1/4" line and neatly plug the end while you fiddle around with the pump, etc. I keep a few in my garage and try to have one or two in the car. Wooden ones are best, as they have some "friction" that helps keep the plug in while you're doing simple repairs.

TURN INDICATOR REMINDER

On a recent club trip there were numerous occasions where we would have to remind each other that we had left on our turn signal. Our Little British Cars are a bit too loud to hear the familiar click-click of the flasher. Since I was frequently one of the offenders I decided to resolve the issue when I got home.

The solution turned out to be very simple and costs less than \$5.00. All you need is a 12Vdc Mini Buzzer (I used Part Number 273-0055 from Radio Shack), a little wire, two ¼" female slide on terminals, two terminal adapters to connect two wires to one connection, and some double face foam tape. See picture 1.


Locate the flasher unit, found under the dash on the right side on a MGB. Connect he Red wire of the buzzer to the Green wire on the flasher and the Black wire of the buzzer to the Green-Red striped wire. Attach the buzzer under the dash using the foam tape and you are done. See picture 2.

The buzzer will sound as the lights flash. If the buzzer is too loud for you just put a piece of tape on it to muffle it.




