


FALL TOUR - COOL AND COLORFUL

Probably no one sets out to make one of the rarest British cars of all time, at least no one who knows the success story of Herbert Austin or Henry Ford. That however became the lot in life for engineers Peter Wilks and George Mackie. The pair left Rover to develop their idea of a two seat sports car. When the car debuted in 1950 it was called the Marauder A. It was followed in 1951 by the Marauder 100, which was capable of exceeding 100 mph due to an additional 20 horsepower. Although both models were roadsters, at least one fixed head coupe was constructed. At this time Britain was still recovering from the ravages of WWII and thus had a very high purchase government decided to double the

tax. To raise even more revenue, the government decided to double the tax on cars which had a pre-tax price over 1000 pounds. Overnight Wilks and Mackie found themselves with a car priced out of the market!

However, both had the good fortune to be able to retreat to positions at Rover once again.

As for Marauder production, a total of 15 cars were manufactured, 10 of which are believed to still exist including the FHC.

It seems like next September couldn't be farther away. But nowadays events need to be planned far in advance in order to work out.




