

DID - U - KNOW By Facia Nearside

In 1906 Alexander Arnold Constantine Issigonis was born in Turkey to Greek and German parents, but he inherited British citizenship through his grandfather who had done work for the British built Smyrna Railway. In 1923 he moved to the UK where he studied engineering then went into the motor industry working for Humber in the 1930s. His passion of designing race cars soon took him to Austin then on to Morris Motors.

While at Morris he began work on a design that later became the MG Y, but the war interrupted plans for production. Following hostilities Issigonis moved to Alvis, then in 1955 was recruited to BMC by Leonard Lord with the intent of designing a new line of family cars...large, medium, and small. Fate intervened however, fuel rationing due to the 1956 Suez Crisis, and Lord ordered Issigonis to bring the small car to production as soon as possible.

Launched in August 1959 as the Morris Mini Minor and Austin Mini, the new car was successful beyond anyone's wildest dreams. Production continued until the year 2000 totaling more than 5.3 million vehicles. Initially nicknamed "The Greek God" by his contemporaries, Alec Issigonis is remembered today as the designer of the best-selling British car in history, the Mini.

Thank you Steve and Polly for a great evening!






















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MG2017: Adventure West in the MGB to attend MG2017

Day 1 The adventure began, June 18th. We traveled to Bloomington, IL, to meet up with our friends, Alan and Terri Kleinschmidt. The first day was driving as far as we could. We had lunch in Springfield, IL and found a motel in Springfield, MO after 542 miles.

Day 2 We detoured onto Route 66, near Joplin, MO to travel the Rainbow Bridge Loop in Baxter Springs, KS. A beautiful ride in rural Kansas, then back to I 44 to get to Oklahoma. In Oklahoma, we traveled Route 66, from El Reno to Hydro. Again, another beautiful drive with the Pony Bridge over the Canadian River. We stayed in our first vintage Route 66 motel, the Flamingo Inn in Elk City, OK. Dinner was at the Prairie Fire, an old train depot.





Day 3 Our travels took us from Elk City, OK to Tucumcari, NM. This was a really fun day driving Route 66 and stopping to see the iconic sites of U- Drop Inn/ Conoco Tower in Shamrock TX, Cadillac Ranch, eating at the Big Texan (Home of the Free 72 oz steak, if you eat it within one hour), and driving through Palo Duro Canyon in Amarillo, TX. The effects of the high temperatures on the car started to show up. Hot idle was non-existent at temperatures over 100. Only recourse was to adjust the idle speed up. The best motel of the trip was the Roadrunner Lodge Motel, Tucumcari, NM. When we opened the door to our room, we were greeted with 60's music and "moon pies" to snack on. Rain cancelled the plan for a bonfire that evening. We took a ride to see the Blue Swallow Motel, ate dinner at Del's Restaurant and the next morning we had breakfast at Kix on 66, three major Route 66 icons.







Day 4 From Tucumcari, NM we journeyed on to Albuquerque, NM, traveling I 40, with a side trip on the Santa Fe Loop (Route 66 pre1937) for the scenic views of the day. Lots of old, rusty cars and rural scenes. We walked around Santa Fe to see the town and had lunch on the historic old town square.

Day 5 Albuquerque, NM to Holbrook, AZ was a day of great scenic drives and national sites. First stop was the Continental Divide, NM. The best part of the day was the scenic drive through the Painted Desert and the Petrified Forest. We could not get reservations in the Wigwams Motel, but we still took pictures of this Rte. 66 icon. It was in Holbrook that we realized our car's gearbox was leaking a lot of oil. In the parking lot of the motel, two quarts of oil was added.

Day 6 Holbrook, AZ to Sedona, AZ. Today's Route 66 stop included The Jack Rabbit Trading Post and "Standin on the Corner in Winslow, AZ. We had a beautiful drive through the Coconino National Forest. After arriving in Sedona, AZ we took the Oak Creek Canyon drive and stopped for lunch in Oak Creek. Later, we took the Red Rock Loop drive in the afternoon and again at sunset. We loved Sedona. We checked the gearbox oil again and discovered it was down two quarts, after only 250 miles of driving. We started to panic, and thought that we would have to rent a U-haul and trailer the car home. Greg decided to experiment and drive without overdrive to see if anything changed.





Day 7 Travels continue south from Sedona, AZ to Yuma, AZ. The temperature flared today, starting the morning out at 81* and peaking at 116* in the late afternoon in Yuma. Driving with the overdrive off solved the oil problem. With a sigh of relief, we completed the trip without overdrive.

Day 8 Today we traveled from Yuma, AZ to San Diego, CA to begin the four day MG2017 car show. Just inside the CA – AZ state line were the Imperial Sand Dunes which were beautiful. Stopped for gas in El Centro, AZ, only to discover within the hour that both of us had our credit cards compromised. We arrived at the Paradise Point Resort, which was our base for the next four days. It turned out not to be "paradise". It was right on the bay. The grounds were beautiful, the bungalows quaint, but management and housekeeping needed lots of improvement.

Day 8- 9-10-11 MG2017 Events included Cars and Coffee breakfast at a park on the bay, a coastal drive from San Diego to La Jolla, CA., with lunch at the Lumberyard in Encinitas, a Back-Country drive with lunch and a stop at a rural store. On our own, we took another drive to La Jolla with our friends. The MG2017 Car show was at the Embarcadero, on the bay within walking distance to Seaport Village. A beautiful venue on the bay with San Diego and Coronado Island as back drops. The guys toured the aircraft carrier, Midway and Terri and I shopped at Seaport Village. We attended the awards banquet and left the next morning to start the journey home.







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Day 12 Our destination today is Kingman, AZ. Our travels took us through the Mojave Desert and along Route 66. We stopped in Oatman, AZ for lunch at the old Oatman Hotel and Brothel and traveled through the Sitgreaves Pass, passed Cool Springs to Kingman. We had dinner in the Route 66 diner, Mr. D'z.

Day 13 We traveled Route 66 from Kingman, AZ to Williams, AZ. We stopped at the Roadkill Café in Ludlow and then Grand Canyon, south rim. The drive was beautiful and Grand Canyon was breathtaking. It's hard to comprehend this natural beauty. The motel in Williams was another vintage stay that was very quaint. The next morning we had breakfast at the Red Garter / Grand Canyon Coffee and Café. This building was a brothel back in William's hey day, but it is now a restaurant and hotel. It is listed as a National Historical site.

Day 14 Heading east, we traveled from Williams, AZ to Kayenta, AZ which is in the Navajo Nation. Our stop today, was Monument Valley, UT which was another amazing view created by nature. The hotel had beautiful Indian murals in the breakfast area.

Day 15 Today, we traveled from Kayenta, AZ to Durango, CO with several stops along the way. We did the touristy thing, and had our pictures taken at the Four Corners of UT-AZ, CO-NM. We then drove through the Pueblo Indian site of Mesa Verde, Co. A beautiful site created by native American Indians. Our car had issues for the second time, but Greg's road side tech session fixed the problem. This time a bolt attached to one of the air filters had vibrated loose and allowed air in the air filter to block the carburetor. At least we were on a side road with a beautiful view. Durango was a great town to stop in. We had a fantastic vintage motel, The Durango Inn, and the owner / manager was very friendly and had previously owned MGB's. We ate downtown and sat on the corner enjoying ice cream.

Day 16 We headed north out of Durango, taking the San Juan Skyway from Durango to Ouray, CO to our destination of Manitou Springs, CO. This was one of the most beautiful, scenic drives of the trip. We passed Silverton, CO an old mining town, stopped in Ouray and continued to Montrose before we turned east on Highway 50 toward Gunnison, CO, driving through the Blue Mesa Reservoir. We stopped at the Gunnisack, in Gunnison for lunch. The highest elevation for this day was the Monarch Pass Summit / Continental Divide, CO at an elevation of 11,312 feet. Our car ran ok at these elevations, the other car not so good.





Day 17 We left Manitou Springs after breakfast with the intention of driving up Pike's Peak. Plan B took place after about spending one-half hour on a steep hillside waiting in line to reach the entrance gate. The queue of cars was at least a mile long. Alan broke the line first because his car was running really so poorly. About 15 minutes later, our car started to overheat, so we got out of line. We decided to just hit the road toward home. We had just entered Kansas, on interstate 70 outside of Goodland, KS, when our car just stopped running due to a distributor issue. FUSES PART II

In the July Chronicle we reprinted Ken Kyles' excellent article "Confused About Fuses". If you missed it and have an LBC it would be worth your time to look it up in order to avoid some safety pitfalls in fuse replacement. As explained in the article, the original Lucas paper type fuses can be replaced by SFE or AGC if necessary, by following some simple guidelines. However it takes only a little more effort to find the correct British replacement which will assure your car's electrical system not only functions as intended but looks original.

Lucas style paper filled fuses are readily available from most of the parts suppliers that we deal with to maintain our older British rides. As with many other parts they may no longer be made in England however. Several sources we checked with knew this but said despite that these new fuses function correctly. If you are looking for a source, fuses of all amperages are available from Moss Motors 800-667-7872, Engel Imports 800-253-4080, and The Roadster Factory 800-234-1104.

If you prefer the real British Lucas paper filled fuses they are easy to source as well, new old stock (NOS) on eBay. Some sellers test and guarantee these items, others are sold as is. In conclusion, back to the point of Ken Kyles' article. It could be dangerous to "over fuse" your LBC, something many of us have been unwittingly doing for years.


