Lauber's Ice Cream Parlor we enjoyed a visit to the East Troy Electric Railroad museum. Over the years BBB attenders have had wonderful experiences and great times enjoying different parts of North America, meeting other MG owners, gaining even more technical knowledge of our beloved LBCs, and spending time with our BBB friends.

This year the convention was held in Louisville, KY with a theme of "Maintaining the Breed". The North American Council of MG Registers with the help and planning of the British Sportscar Club of Louisville had a big challenge putting together this 4 day event, and what a splendid job! There was a reception at Churchill Downs which included a tour, days of special tech sessions hosted by many British car specialists including John Twist of University Motors, a free concert, special sessions to introduce us to Derby-Pie or to make a fascinator hairpiece, and several bus tours and self-guided tour maps to places of local interest. That was all before the car show held at Louisville's Waterfront Park, with over 800 cars registered and the awards banquet that evening with over 1,000 attending! Congratulations to Ron and Nancy Kuhnau who took 3rd place in their division with their green MGB!

Our traveling group made it a 2 day trip down. The further we traveled into southern Indiana the more beautiful the countryside became. Even though it was hot, we persevered and arrived intact. The weather continued hot all week, but everyone chose events they wanted to participate in and explored the area. Because we did so many different things, I asked each couple to contribute a small article of what they enjoyed most. So, enjoy those reflections and a few of the many photos that we all took!

Oh, I almost forgot! Remember when our club got caught up in a tractor parade crossing the Mackinaw Bridge? Well, 3 cars traveled home together and stopped north of Seneca, IL as a parade of motorcycles passed us going south. There must have been over 1,000 - and took at least 45 minutes! We sure did a lot of waving.

BRUCE & PHYLLIS BENEDITZ: Tuesday Bruce and I decided to try one of the self-directed drives. We picked a drive into southern Indiana to Squire Boone Caverns. It was a very pleasant drive as we meandered along and through the knobs on our way to the caverns. Once we arrived we found not only the caverns, but a small town setting with a grist mill, a candle shop, a soap shop, and a rock shop where you could mine for fool's gold. We even ate lunch in Boone's Kitchen and Candy Shop where almost everything was homemade! But I digress.

The Caverns were found by Squire and his brother Daniel Boone in 1790 and later Squire used these caves to hide from a band of hostile Indians. He came back to this area to settle with his wife, four sons and their families. After climbing down 73 stairs on the spiral staircase, we entered the caverns which were a nice 54 degrees – a nice change from the 90+ it was outside. The formations were wonderful to see including an underground waterfall! It was awe-inspiring to see what nature has created over thousands of years. After coming out of the caverns, we made our way back to Kentucky with a stop on the way at Brooks Hill Winery for some refreshments. We arrived back in Louisville just as a thunderstorm arrived with a hearty downpour. We got soaked just getting inside from the parking lot!!

DAWN FARRIS & RICH BOGEN (Madison British Car Group): The trip was a very scenic ride on some beautiful roads once we left the flat of the Midwest plains. This was totally due to our fine navigators who used every media available to great advantage for us. The event and the car show were very well organized. Lots to do and see. Churchill Downs was a particular show stopper. It was so wonderful to be walking around on a piece of American history. You could feel the energy all around you.

The best part of the trip was traveling and getting to spend time with the folks from your club. I feel like we have made some great new friends. I love the way you travel and look forward to more adventures. We really enjoyed ourselves. Thanks so much for letting us tag along.

DON & MARNA GROSENECK: One of the local attractions that we were especially interested in visiting was the Willett Distillery. My maiden name was Willett – and you never know – they could be my long, lost relatives.

The Willett Distillery is a private family owned and operated company that produces various brands of bourbon and rye whiskey. Most brands produced by the company are in the premium category and range from 6 to 17 years of aging maturity, with some of the bottlings being aged as long as 25 years. The company is located on the outskirts of beautiful, historic Bardstown, Kentucky on the site of the original Willett family farm. It has remained under family ownership and operation since 1935. The company only employs about 14 people – 8 to 12 line workers and four family members.

RICK & SANDY HAMAKER: It was hot!!!!! We enjoyed the back roads going down and back. Seeing all those MG's in the parking lot at the hotel and at the show field is always exciting. We learned about Derby Pie, V-8 conversions and MG restorations. We enjoyed the Churchill Downs tour. But what we enjoyed most was spending time with our friends, traveling, trying new restaurants, and seeing new sites.

DAVE JEFFERSON (Milwaukee Club): Wow, what a meet, the biggest I've ever witnessed. I enjoyed MG 2016 and stayed in a very comfortable hotel within walking distance of the hotel that served as base operations for all the registers. I heard there were over 800 cars on the field for the riverfront MG show the final full day. At the awards banquet that same evening 1000 were served dinner buffet style. This was the most organized and efficient MG gathering I have attended. I drove to Louisville and home again, with 2 days each way, 4 days total, allotted for travel in order to go easy on the MGA... as well as me!

Louisville Moment # 1: On the show grounds I met up with Ray from Gurnee IL, who called my cell phone the day before. 50 years ago, we not only went to Nicolet H.S., but were cast in the same musical "The King & I" in 1965! I was astounded, and told the owner and his wife, and they were knocked out as well. Most likely these cars came down the assembly line the same day back in April of 1961. How amazing. Thanks to club members Rich Bogen & Dawn Farris for teaming up with me for part of the drive, and arranging for our 1 MGA / 6 MGB group to travel together. Always more fun with a group.

RON & NANCY KUHNAU: We decided to tour downtown Louisville and started with a stop at the Historic Brown Hotel. The Hotel is English Renaissance and designed by Preston Bradshaw. The 600 room hotel was built in 10 months in 1926 and owned and funded by James Graham Brown at a cost of 4 million dollars. During Derby Week many celebrates have stayed at the hotel including The Duke of Windsor. Truly beautiful. Our next stop was the Louisville Slugger Museum where we watched the making of the bats. The bats are currently made of Ash and the Ash forest owned by the company has about another 10 years before it is depleted. Ron also enjoyed the many Tech Sessions that were offered at MG2016.



DID - U - KNOW by Facia Nearside

Credit for the birth of the automobile is usually given to Carl Benz. He developed a very successful one-cylinder two-stroke engine in 1879 and was then able to mate this power plant to a vehicle of his own design. The two seat, three wheel vehicle first ran in 1885 and was granted a patent one year later.

In the 130 years since Benz Model No. 1, there have been many successful 3-wheelers, some with the single wheel in the front, others with it at the rear, but the prize for the smallest belongs to the Peel P50. The 3 wheel microcar was built on the Isle of Man from 1962-1965 and weighed just 123 lb. This one seat, one door, one headlight, one wiper car was reported to be able to carry one driver and one bag of groceries. Powered by a 4.2HP engine with a 3 speed transmission, it had no reverse. The rear was conveniently fitted with a handle to pick it up and turn it the other way.

Although a bargain at £199 in 1962 an original car sold in March 2016 for \$176,000! But don't despair; Peel Engineering Ltd. started re-manufacturing the P50 in 2010. The updated version is now available starting at £10,399, and it even features a reverse gear.



LITTLE KNOWN FACT!


"The world's largest collection of 1929 and 1930 Nash Motors automobiles exists not in a museum," writes *MLive Reporter*, Garret Ellison, "but rather entombed in the frigid depths of Lake Michigan." This intriguing article looks at the sinking of the *Senator*, which went down in 450 feet of water off the coast of Wisconsin in 1929. Onboard were 268 brand-new Nash vehicles bound for dealerships in Michigan and across the Midwest. According to the handful of underwater explorers who have actually seen the wreck, reports Ellison, many of the cars are all very much preserved and still lined up "in neat little rows" inside the ship's crumpled hold.
