

The current church, with twin bell towers, was built in 1931. The view of the countryside from the front doors of the church is breathtaking. You can see for miles and with the sun shining the fall colors around the church were amazing.

Four club members, 2 women and 2 men, did climb the 178 stairs to the top of the bell tower for incredible views of the fall color.




BIG FOOT INN BIG OCTOBER DRIVE & DINE SUCCESS

TYRES part 2 by Facia Nearside


Scotsman Robert William Thomson, a prolific inventor with a keen sense for innovation, patented the first pneumatic (inflatable) tyre in 1847 at the age of 23. He designed a rubberized canvas tube enclosed in an outer leather casing which bolted to a wooden wheel. He called them "aerial wheels" and several were fitted to horse-drawn carriages in London greatly improving the ride and reducing noise. Despite this the idea did not catch on, as the materials were crude and there was no real need for this product.


Another Scotsman, John Boyd Dunlop (yes, that Dunlop), reinvented the pneumatic tyre 40 yeas later in 1887. A veterinary surgeon who had knowledge and experience with rubber, Dunlop was looking for a way to make his young son's tricycle roll along more easily. He designed an inflatable tube of sheet rubber and enclosed it in an outer rubber casing producing the first practical pneumatic tyre. Having no knowledge of Thomson's previous work, Dunlop also patented the concept.

This time other events conspired to catapult the pneumatic tyre into the limelight. The "safety bicycle", or first practical bicycle as we know it today, had just been invented in 1885 and bicycle racing was becoming all the rage. Dunlop made the connection that if his tyres were good on a tricycle they'd be great on a bicycle. Soon the cyclists winning races were the ones using Dunlop's pneumatic tyres. To Dunlop the veterinarian, this was all just a distraction from his primary interests, so he sold the right to his idea for some cash and a small share in the pneumatic tyre business. Within two years Dunlop's patent was also declared invalid because of the earlier filing by Thomson.

Despite these setbacks for Dunlop, the pneumatic tyre was here to stay. The world was becoming enamored with a new contraption called the automobile. Early examples rode on little more than glorified bicycle tyres, so the transition of this concept was a natural. The first use of pneumatic tyres for automobiles occurred when the Michelin brothers equipped a racecar with them in 1895. Although the car didn't win the race it generated considerable interest and soon Michelin became the leading producer of tyres in Europe.

To arrive at the product that we take for granted in today's world, three more major improvements were necessary, two made by the very recognizable names of Goodyear and Goodrich. We will pick this story up again in part three.
